# Important Information

#### Plot

As a baby, Harry Potter finds himself on the doorstep of the Dursleys household and is subsequently raised by his uncle and auntie. He suffers a torrid childhood where he is bullied by Vernon's son Dudley and treated unkindly. Before his eleventh birthday, Harry receives letter after letter but he is unable to open them. When finally he does, he finds out that he can attend Hogwarts – a school for wizards. Thus begins his incredible journey, meeting friends Hagrid, Ron and Hermione along the way.


#### Themes

Love, Choice, Rebellion, Humility, Friendship, Life Vs Death and Power.

#### Setting

The Dursleys live in Little Whinging, Surrey where the story starts but soon Harry travels with Hagrid to Gringotts (a bank), Dlagon Alley (to find a wand) and then eventually to King's Cross train station in London where he is able to magically transport himself to Hogwarts. The school is set in the highlands of Scotland, next to a loch called Black Lake and near the Forbidden Forest. The grounds have a huge Quidditch pitch which is featured in some of the chapters, as well as Hagrid's hut and surrounding gardens.

#### Characters Protagonist - An 11-year-old boy with a scar on his head who is Harry Potter already well-known for surviving an attack on him as a baby. An excellent student who follows the rules and can be bossy. Hermione Grainger Ginger-haired boy from a poorer family than most at Hogwarts. Ron Wesley Professor Dumbledore Headmaster of Hogwarts, wizard and Voldemort's only feared enemy. Voldemort Antagonist - He-Who-Must-Not-Be-Named rose to power in the 1970s and 1980s and, during his reign of terror, only Hogwarts was safe. He was torn from power and has been gathering strength ever since ready to steal the Philosopher's Stone. Hagrid A giant who helps and befriends Harry. Antagonist - Member of Slytherin who takes a dislike to Harry. Draco Malfov Professor McGonagall Head of Gryffindor house and able to turn into a cat. Antagonist - Head of Slytherin who shows favouritism to Malfoy. Professor Snape Quirrell is the Defence Against the Dark Arts professor. Professor Quirrell Gryffindor student who is nervous, forgetful and often clumsy. Neville Longbottom Vernon Dursley Antagonist - Harry's uncle who spoils Dudley and is mean to Harry. Harry's auntie who is also unkind to Harry. Petunia Dursley Harry's cousin and son of Vernon who gets special treatment. **Dudley Dursley** A snowy owl that Hagrid gives Harry for his birthday. Hedwia Mr Ollivander Owner of a wand shop in Diagon Alley. Fred & George Weasley Third-year students and twin brothers of Ron Weasley. James Potter Harry's father who died when he was a baby. Lily Potter Harry's mother who died when he was a baby.



### What Can the Book Teach Us?

You never know what you are capable of until you try.
The power of the choices you make can have an impact on our wellbeing, on our lives, and on the lives of others.

Context - Rowling has said she was a fan of the works of C. S. Lewis as a child, and mentions the influence of The Chronicles of Narnia on her work: "I found myself thinking about the wardrobe route to Narnia when Harry is told he has to hurl himself at a barrier in King's Cross station—it dissolves and he's on platform Nine and Three-Quarters, and there's the train for Hogwarts." The Sword in the Stone, with Arthur, who is a small scruffy-haired orphan, meets the wizard Merlin (who has an owl and acts, much like Dumbledore, in the manner of an "absent-minded professor) who takes him to a castle to educate him. Other books which have similar themes are J.R.R. Tolkien's The Hobbit and Lord of the Rings series with books filled with dragons, wizards and beasts, Roald Dahl's horrid families like the Dursleys in books such as Matilda, James and the Giant Peach and George's Marvellous Medicine. Before the arrival of J. K. Rowling, Britain's bestselling author was comic fantasy writer Terry Pratchett. His Discworld books, beginning with The Colour of Magic in 1983, saw a world of children's books filled with wizards and witches. He wrote 41 novels in total from the Discworld series and sold over 80 million copies worldwide.
